GERUNDS-USE


1. As the subject or object of a sentence

- Collecting flowers is my hobby.
- I like collecting flowers.



2. After prepositions

- They are interested in studying archaeology.
- They dream of becoming archaeologists.
- They are crazy about discovering ancient cities.
- They are tired of digging in the sand.

3. After specific verbs such as:








start stop continue Begin finish quit give up practise
